Medical Student Council (MSC)

Individuals and organizations with membership in the MSC are marked with an asterisk (*)

The Medical Student Council is the student-led governing body of that Long School of Medicine that advocates for the interest of medical students, forms official opinions regarding administrative policies, represents the study body in its interactions with the university, and promotes communication, cooperation, and understanding between the students, faculty, and administration. The council is comprised of representatives from all classes and other committee/leadership groups. Students on the MSC work closely with the Office of Undergraduate Medical Education.

CLASS LEADERSHIP

Class Representative* (four per class)

Description: Class Representatives support and advocate for their medical school colleagues, both within and across classes. Additionally, class representatives have varied responsibilities including organizing events, communicating important information, and fundraising.

Curriculum Committee Representative*

The Curriculum Committee Representative attends Curriculum Committee meetings in the Office of Undergraduate Medical Education on a monthly basis. Monthly meetings are 2-3 hours in length and require little work outside of committee attendance. This representative brings his or her classes' perspective to the meeting and gives valuable student insight to issues about grading, course approval, and any other curricular issues.

Diversity Advisory Council Student Liaison

The student liaison will serve as the link between the LSOM student body and the LSOM Diversity Advisory Council. Liaisons keep the council informed regarding ongoing diversity and inclusion issues and provide suggestions to the council and Vice Dean for Inclusion & Diversity and Chief Diversity Officer. The liaison is expected to maintain confidentiality on all council business work projects.

Research Liaison

Research Liaisons are the link between your medical class and the Long School of Medicine's Office of Research. Liaisons give the Office of Research suggestions on helpful research-related services for students. Liaisons also serve to communicate research programs to students in their class. Liaisons have input on critical areas, including Research Connect, class presentations, poster sessions, and more.

Student Government Association (SGA) Representative*

Serve as the primary liaison between medical students and university faculty and staff. The SGA is composed of Representatives from each school at UT Health San Antonio. Representatives obtain feedback from colleagues to present at monthly SGA meetings. In addition, SGA Representatives might speak to University officials, are invited to special university-wide events, and are required to participate in biannual SGA service events.

Veritas

MS1 Veritas Liaison: Two people from each Veritas Society (Red, Yellow, Purple, Green and Blue) apply to becoming MS1 Liaisons. The Liaisons are the equivalent to an "Executive Board" for Veritas Peer Advisors (see below). Liaisons serve as a conduit between the VPAs in their society and the Lead VPAs (see below for description). They also are the main team that plans and executes Color Wars in the spring and the MS1 retreat in July. Each Liaison is also appointed a role, such as social media coordinator, logistics, historian, alumni relations, and lead VPAs (separate application process). Liaisons also serve as a VPA for their Veritas Family.

Lead Veritas Peer Advisor (VPA)*: Lead VPAs provide vision and direction for Veritas and serve as the leaders for the MS1 Liaisons and VPAs. They delegate and spearhead the planning for Color Wars in the spring, the MS1 Retreat in July, as well as other events. They oversee the processes of choosing, training, and managing the VPAs. They help the Lead MiMs with developing meaningful curriculum for MS1/MS2 meetings. They also serve as VPA for their Veritas Family.

Veritas Peer Advisors (VPAs): Veritas Peer Advisors serve as mentors to incoming medical students. VPAs are expected to attend Veritas meetings, leadership training, and society-wide events. VPAs also help facilitate Color Wars and the MS1 Retreat. Additionally, VPAs meet individually with their MS1 students to ensure a smooth transition to medical school. VPAs might also use these meetings to help students find appropriate campus resources.

Organization of Student Representatives (OSR) for the AAMC*
